Respondent was not anxious to grant me an interview. He insisted that I secure an interview with Dr. Silberfield of Temple B'Nai Abraham. He also advised me to secure an interview from a prominent Hugarian-Jew, Mr. Kaufman, who lives on Seymour Avenue, two blocks from Bergen Avenue. Mr. Kaufman is editor of the Jewish Chronicle.

While I was taling with the respondent, I secured the following information:

Many Jews moved to Clinton Hill in 1919. Many Jewish Storekeepers moved to Hawthorne Avenue and opened stores which to-day are found on that Avenue from Elizabeth Avenue to Fabian Place. Many of the sons and daughters of these storekeepers have gotten into professions or into wholesale selling.

In 1919 one did not find German-Jews marrying Jews of other nationalities but to-day second generation German-Jews marry second generation Russian-Jews.

There is more unity to-day between Jews of different nationalities. German-Jews belong to congregations composed of Russian and Polish Jews.
