JEWS IN NEWARK

Abraham, son of Louis Trier, was the first Jewish child born in Newark, in 1844.

The firs Jewish wedding in Newark, Leah Reach to Solomon Livine, Was performed July 25, 1853.

B. (for Benjamin) Altman, who founded the great New York department store, worked as clerk in ^Newark in his youth.

The first Jewish congregation B'nai Jeshurun, was organized August 20, 1848.

STAR, April 15, 1936 PIONEER SYNAGOGUE FORMED IN 1848

The first Jewish religious organization of Newark was effected August 20, 1848, when a group meeting in a house on Washington street formed the Pioneer Synagogue. A Synagogue was occupied at the corner of Academy and Washington streets for a year. In 1858 a Temple was erected at the corner of Washinton and Willians streets.

In 1867 a second temple was erected at 324 Washington street, similar to a temple in Berlin, of Moorish Architecture.

STAR APRIL 15, 1936 POLITICAL TOASTS OF OTHER DAYS

One hundred years have passed since Newark became a city, but even in township days the public vioced its cynicism at the maneuvers of the early Congresses. Toasts indicated the feeling of the times. One proclaimed: "The house of Representativies: All talk and no cider." Another went: "The next Congress: May they think ... more of their business and less of their pay."

NEWS APRIL 14, 1936

SYNAGOGUES ARE OPENED BANAI JESHURUM CONGREGATION.

B'nai Jeshurum Congregation, Newark's first organized Jewish group, was started August 20, 1848, at the Home of Isaac S. Cohen who lived at 338 Washington street.

The new congregation, the first in the state, elected Mr. Cohen president, Abraham Eustesheimer vice president and Louis Trier treasurer. Abraham and Isaac Newman were made the first cantor.

The congregation was inconporated October 6, 1848, and services started in what had been a church in Harison street, now Halsey street. A plot of ground was purchased in the woods in the outskirts of the city or a cemetery far sout in what is now Belmont avenue, near Spruce street.

The congregation moved from one place to another for several years until, in 1858, it realized its dream of a synagogue in a \$5,500 edifice at the corner of Washington street and Maiden Lane.

B'nai Jeshurun had been formed almost entirely of immigrants from Germany, idealists, who seeing their dreams of freedom and opportunity thwarted in Europe, had come to a new promised land.

Then Polish Jews came to Newark, fleeing the persecution of their native land. Abraham Newman welcomed his coreligionists and invited them to use his Bank street home as a place for worship. In 1855 they met at 107 Market street and incorporated, in honor of their friend and patron, as Congregation B'nai Abraham. Isaac S. Cohen, who had left Newark for a brief stay in New York, returned to become one of the first trustees of the new congregation Others were Lesser Marks, Isaac Solomon, Abraham Winters and Israel Leventell.

In 1860 came a split in the ranks of B'nai Jeshurun, and many of the members, including the leaders, resigned and rented a room at 33 Prince street. They incorporated as Congregation Oheb Shalom. On the first board of trustees were Philip Holzner, Benjamin W. Jeiteles, Leopold Lang, Jacob Eckstein, Abraham Horwitz, Henry Weiss and Leopold Weil.

These three, the olders and the largest, were the congregations in Newark. B'nai Jeshurun now follows the reform tenets of Judaism, The other two belong to the conservative wing. The largest congregation in the city wich still adheres to the orthodox rituals is Anshe Russia, organized fifty-one years ago.
