

Mass demonstrations at the construction site of the new Bar-ringer High School will be staged Wednesday by the Newark Coordinating Council unless construc-tion work is halfed by that time, the council has announced. It is calling for a stoppage of construc-tion work "until such time as Negroes and Puerto Ricans are engaged in all category of the building trades on this job."

The council made known its intent to demonstrate in resolu tions it sent over the weekend to Mayor Addonizio, the Newark Human Rights Commission and Gov. Hughes.

George C. Richardson, the council's coordinator, said the demonstrations at Barringer were decided on after a "thorough in-vestigation to determine if Negroes and Puerto Ricans were full participants and equally em-

Ployed on this project." He said the investigation dis-closed that of about 200 building trades workers employed on the project, 12 are Negroes and there are no Puerto Ricans. Of the 12 Negroes, seven are laborers, four are carpenters and one is a brick-Richardson said no Negroes are employed as electricians, plumblayer.

ers ironworkers, steamfitters and ers fronworkers, steamfitters and lathers. Declaring the Negroes on the job represent about only 6 per cent of the total work force, he said: "It is obvious that dis-criminatory hiring practices pre-vent Negroes and Puerto Ricans from equal employment opportu-nities."

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The council's resolution de-mands that Addonizio halt work on the project and that he notify the contractors and unions in-il volved that work will not be continued "until such time as Negroes and Puerto Ricans are engaged in all categories." The council reiterated its pre-vious announcement that it will il rt Z-'S conduct mass demonstrations at selected construction sites throughout the city July 10 if Ad-donizio does not adopt its plan for equal job opportunities. s, rnd
