# 225 Negroes in Job Bias Protest

Violence broke out today at the construction site of the new Barringer High School, when 225 Negroes and a few whites picketed against alleged racial discrimination in jobs.

The violence erupted at 6th Avenue and Ridge Street, when 50 construction workers who had gathered nearby, moved on the picket line in an effort to reach the construction site. Some of the pickets had been sitting on the ground.

About 25 policemen were caught between the workers and the pickets. Both sides used their fists and several workers and pickets were thrown to the ground in the melee. Assemblyman George C. Richardson, D-Essex, the only Negro in the state Legislature, who organized the picketing, was bodily lifted from the street by police.

The fight lasted for about five minutes. It was followed by several sporadic fistfights at the same entrance. Police subsequently were able to force a path to permit workers to reach the site
