The full name is John William Smith currently residing at 47 South Street. During the night of the incident I was employed as a taxi cab driver.

Relative to the incident, I had picked up this woman passenger in the vicinity of City Hospital, and she was on

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her way over to the Weequahic section. I took Sixth Street south over to Fifteenth Avenue. As I recall, it wes a rather slow night. It was somewhere between ninethirty or eleven-thirty, somewhere between those hours I would think. Anyway, I picked this lady passenger up in the vicinity of City Hospital, and I was coming over Sixth Street to Fifteenth Avenu. When I arrived at Fifteenth Avenue I made a right turn, and in making the turn I saw this police car double-parked at the corner of South Seventh Street and Fifteenth Avenue, Vell, Fifteenth Avenue is a major thoroughfare, but I gave them the courtesy of a signal anyway, and then I passed and in the process I was given a signal to stop. So I pulled over.

There was a vacant space right at the intersection of Seventh Street and Fifteenth Avenue, so I pulled into the vacant space. The police car pulled along side, and he asked for the license and registration. So I got the license and the registration, and I gave them to him and I asked him what happened. He said I popped am intersection. I said, "I don't see how because you were double-parked and I thought you were working and I just made a normal pass." So he said, "No, no, this vehicle was in motion. " to leave to the term of t

incensed about this because he jumped out of the police car and snatched the door open and told me to get out because I was under arrest. Then he insulted the passenger and told her to get the hell out of the car because I was under arrest.

snother car to come pick up the cab. So we sit there in the car and wait for the other police car to come. So they came and said they would take care of the cab and then we proceeded to the Fourth Precinct.

So as he started off and made his turn and started to the precinct, them one of the policemen that was sitting in front, he turned around on his knees on the front seat and he started punching on me. So the other policemen that was driving, he said, "No, don't let out on him." I assume he meant by that not to beat him up. He said, "No, no, this beby is mine." So then he proceeded to punch on me. He didn't seem to be getting the desired result with his fists, so he looked down in the car some place and got his nightstick and then he started using his nightstick on me. So I held up my hand to try to protect my face, and then he jabbed me in the groin with the stick. So then I fell over on the floor in the back of the car between the two seats and starting throwing up.

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So when we got to the police station then they started to dragging me out of the car and started dragging me down the street because I couldn't walk because of this intense pain, you know, where he jabbed me with the stick. So I couldn't walk because of that intense pain. So they drug me out of the car and started dragging me down the street.

Some of the citizens in the community, they said, "You don't have to drag him like that." I heard several other voices say, "You could at least carry him in." After this outburst from the citizens them someone picked up my feet and they carried me in the station.

So after they let these people in there they asked me if I was burt or if I needed to see a doctor. I told them I think they have caved in my ribs. They took me over to the Beth Israel Hospital, and over there during the course of examination and treatment they found out that my ribs was caved in and there was other internal injuries.
